Combining the analytical skills of literary study with the investigative approach of language analysis, the course fosters a deep understanding of how English works in real-world and imaginative contexts. Students also develop their own voice through original writing, producing creative pieces inspired by their study





COURSE CONTENT

Voices in Speech and Writing

- Study of an Edexcel anthology of 20 fiction and non-fiction texts across a variety of genres including blogs, articles, film scripts and interviews.
- · Exploration of voice, persona, audience, and purpose
- Study of A Streetcar Named Desire by Tennessee Williams
- Analysis of how cultural and social context affects meaning

Varieties in Language and Literature

- Study of The Great Gatsby by F. Scott Fitzgerald
- Study of Othello by William Shakespeare
- · Thematic focus: society and the individual
- Independent research into non-fiction texts on the theme

Non-Exam Assessment (Original Writing)

- Independent selection of one fiction and one non-fiction source text
- Production of one original fiction and one original non-fiction text
- Reflective commentary analysing creative choices and influences
- · Focus on writing for specific audiences and purposes



)- SKILLS REQUIRED

GCSE grade 6 and above in both Language and Literature. This course is suitable for students who have an interest is all aspects of English, including both literary and linguistic analysis and creative writing.



ASSESSMENT

Paper 1: Voices in Speech and Writing Written exam. 2 hours 30 minutes. 40% of final marks

- Section A: Comparative essay on two anthology texts
- Section B: Essay response to an extract from A Streetcar Named Desire

Paper 2: Varieties in Language and Literature Written exam. 2 hours 30 minutes. 40% of final marks

- Section A: comparative essay on The Great Gatsby and Othello
- Section B: A response to an unseen nonfiction prose extract

Non-Examined Assessment: Original Writing Coursework. 20% of final marks. Assessed by

teachers, moderated by AQA.

• Two original writing pieces (one fiction, one non-fiction) with a reflective commentary. 2,500-3,000 words total (including commentary)
