Sociology helps you make sense of the world around you — why people behave the way they do, how society is organised, and what shapes our identities and opportunities. It's an engaging subject for anyone curious about people, culture and social change.

You'll explore real-world issues such as crime, inequality, media influence and education, learning to question assumptions, evaluate evidence and debate big ideas. It's a discussion-based course that develops critical thinking, communication and analytical skills, all highly valued by universities and employers.

Sociology pairs brilliantly with Psychology, History, Economics, and Geography, but it also works well alongside other subjects, such as Sciences and Mathematics, providing a strong foundation for degrees in the social sciences, law, and humanities.

∠≶ ASSESSMENT

All course content is examined at the end of the 2-year course and is assessed by three written papers.

Paper 1: Socialisation and Culture Written exam. 2 hours 30 minutes. 40% of final marks

Paper 2: Methods of Sociological Enquiry Written exam. I hour 45 minutes. 20% of final

Paper 3: Power and Stratification Written exam. 2 hours 30 minutes. 40% of final marks



ENRICHMENT

Sociology Students have opportunities to attend lectures, conferences and workshops exploring real-world issues such as media representation, crime and social justice. Cross-department collaborations with Psychology encourages wider discussion and deeper understanding. For those keen to go further, a wider reading clinic allows students to explore current research and present findings for peer discussion and critical evaluation.
